Clinical Guidelines Summary Dosing Advice

Three regular doses of paracetamol suspension 120mg/5ml (sugar free) are recommended following MenB vaccination.

For babies born before 32 weeks gestation and currently weighing less than 4kg, paracetamol for post vaccination fever should be prescribed by a GP as detailed below.

Paracetamol to Prevent and Treat Fever After MenB Vaccination in Babies Aged 2-4 Months

This dosing advice has been prepared in consultation with West of Scotland Neonatal Specialist Pharmacists and takes into account dosing advice in the BNFc and the type of oral syringes available in the community for ease of administration.

Clinical Guidelines Summary Background information

NHS Public Health Scotland advise giving paracetamol suspension 120mg/5ml (sugar free) at the time of MenB vaccination, or as soon as possible afterwards, in order to reduce the risk of the baby developing a fever. The standard information sheet provided to patients is

What to expect after immunisation: Babies and children up to 5 years (publichealthscotland.scot).

This is provided to parents well in advance of immunisation so that supplies of paracetamol can be obtained by parents from the pharmacy or supermarket and this system has worked well for several years.

However, for babies born before 32 weeks gestation and currently weighing less than 4kg, paracetamol for post vaccination fever must be prescribed by a GP according to the baby's weight at the time of vaccination.

In practice, Health Visitors know such children very well and liaise with the baby's GP to arrange a suitable prescription and supply in advance of vaccination. The dosing instructions in this guideline are based on expert recommendation for this specific situation and are designed to aid a suitable supply by giving a guideline which is easily accessible for both Health Visitors and GP Practice teams.

The dosing advice in this guideline is for this specific purpose so may differ to those in the product literature for paracetamol suspension (for the relief of pain and other causes of fever).
