

Elective endotracheal intubation

When endotracheal intubation is done electively, rather than as an emergency, the baby should be given effective analgesia and a muscle relaxant. This should facilitate an easier, more rapid intubation.

Prior to intubation:

- 1. Undertake intubation pause and ensure drugs below are drawn up.
- 2. Ensure adequate analgesia in the form of an IV bolus of morphine sulphate unless the baby is already on a morphine infusion. Suxamethonium does not provide any pain relief for the intubation and may cause painful muscle spasms.
- 3. Atropine rescue: Atropine Sulphate (IV) should be drawn up ready to give if required. This will help counter any bradycardia and salivation that occurs.
- 4. Give suxamethonium intravenously by bolus injection.

Position of the ETT can be verified using the Pedi-cap
