Clinical Guidelines Summary

• This guideline details a recommended Treatment Plan to accompany Section 47 paperwork¹ for care home residents. This will guide healthcare professionals and care home staff caring for patients who have multiple and complex needs.

• The format of the Treatment Plan is included below. It should be attached to a Certificate of Incapacity and retained in the patient's multidisciplinary case record.

• The Adults with Incapacity Act¹ requires health care professionals to take the views of others into account when deciding on an intervention. The Treatment Plan should be discussed with professional carers and relatives of the patient.

• Health Care professionals may find that they need to treat a condition that is not specified in the treatment plan².

• For short lived conditions - a separate certificate could be produced.

• For conditions that are likely to need ongoing intervention – Consideration should be given to rewriting the treatment plan.

• The Treatment Plan is only valid for the period specified in the certificate of incapacity

1. Fundamental Healthcare procedures including all measures to promote or safeguard the following: nutrition, hydration, hygiene, skin care and integrity, pain relief, mobility, communication, eyesight, hearing and simple oral hygiene.

2. Routine medical interventions as performed by a General Practitioner or their proxy including physical examination and routine health screening. Routine and non-routine investigation, treatment of acute and chronic health conditions within care home setting.

3. Assessment and interventions as required from Community Nursing Team and Allied Health Professionals including physiotherapy, OT, SALT, dietetics, podiatry within care hoe setting.

4. Treatment with antibiotics and seasonal immunisations including Influenza, Pneumococcal and COVID-19.

5. Chronic disease monitoring and management including CKD, Hypertension, Cerebrovascular disease, COPD, Asthma, Thyroid issues.

6. Community Vaccination Service to administer seasonal vaccination as national programme recommends. Response remains with Care Home Staff to obtain individual consent.
